ELECTION PLATFORMS: Targeting older Ontarians

CARP has collected the platform promises targeted at older Ontarians by each of the four main parties. We've taken the liberty of explaining some of the issues presented, but the information is otherwise taken directly from the respective party platforms.

The platform items are organized by issue rather than party to allow for easier comparison issue by issue, starting with healthcare, followed by energy prices and 'other' issues relevant to older voters.

The platforms are the 'official' vision for Ontario of each party, as such, we omitted promises made in the media or the debates and focused instead on concrete proposals.

All the costs and savings associated with party proposals, where they are provided by the parties, are taken from official platforms. We will continue to ask the parties to provide more information as to anticipated costs and/or savings and update this chart when we can. Each of the four main parties promises to eliminate the deficit at the same time, by 2015/16.

The material below represents those items directly relevant to older Canadians. As a result, the respective parties may have stated or elaborated promises not included in the information below and other items of interest not listed below can be found in the full party platforms.

CARP does not support any one party, and the information below is meant only as a neutral guide through the issues that have been targeted toward older Ontarians. Our intent is to give our readers the information they need to make informed decisions on October 6, 2011.

Healthcare

In Ontario, almost half of all program spending is dedicated to healthcare. Each party proposes to maintain health spending, which means the biggest differences between the parties are in allocation of healthcare dollars rather than the total amount being proposed for spending.

Each Party has a comprehensive plan for the overall health system, including cost saving measures, but there is some divergence on the respective central planks on seniors' health. The Liberal Party Platform focuses primarily on supporting homecare, the PCs focus on long-term care, the NDP focus on wait times for acute long-term care, and the Green Party is supporting a spectrum of continuing care.

ENERGY PRICES

Energy prices have risen steeply over the past several years and as a result, each party has addressed the issue. The Liberal and Green Parties are running on the position that clean energy comes at a cost while the PCs and NDP propose wholesale reductions in the cost of energy through cancellation of the HST and other measures. Voters will have to decide on which side of the energy debate they fall.
