





In PEI, Casey McGannon has stepped aside (with a new Chair pending)


In Belleville-Brighton-Quinte West, Ken Prue stepped down and Mary Robertson is the new Chair.

The entire family of CARP and ZoomerMedia Limited were shocked and saddened to learn of the sudden passing of the dedicated and long-serving CARP volunteer, Mr. Terry Little.

Terry served for many years on the board of the Brantford, Ontario CARP Chapter. At the time of his death he held the position of Vice-Chair and immediate Past-Chair, and was instrumental in the planning, execution and success of the annual Brantford Seniors Resource Fair, and many social and informational events for CARP members and seniors in the community of Brantford. Terry was passionate about the mission of CARP and worked diligently to improve the lives of Zoomers in his community.

Despite his own challenges, Terry's work ethic and involvement in CARP were an inspiration to our office and



broader community of CARP Chapters and volunteers across Canada.

Terry was a long time enthusiast of Tropical Fish, and a member of the

Brant Aquarium Society. He was actively involved with the Canadian Association of Aquarium Clubs for many years holding numerous executive and board of directors positions. For years he served as a long time Judge at many Tropical Fish shows held in Southern Ontario and he also ran his own fish store for a number of years.

Terry died from complications of his lifelong struggle with spina-bifida this past summer. A memorial service was held with family, friends and members of the CARP community attending.

In Terry's honour, CARP is initiating a memorial award in his name that will be presented annually to recognize exceptional volunteer commitment to the mission and values of CARP.

Reflections on the 2011 AGM

Busy Fall Season for CARP

Our annual "gathering of the clan" set a new benchmark this year with an energizing, informative and idea-filled four days, comprised of the ZoomerLife Conference, The CARP Annual General Meeting and the two-day Zoomer Show. As has become the tradition, the CARP-sponsored ZoomerLife Conference, hosted by Moses Znaimer, got things started with an excellent roster of presenters who shared their insights and expertise on health, wellness and longevity.

Following the formal aspects of the AGM, Chaired by Susan Eng, the Community Development session started with excellent presentations by Chapter Chairs Dawn Edgley (Brockville-Thousand Islands), Paul Reisman (Montreal), Bernice Rempel (Edmonton), Denise Kelly (North Shore Vancouver) and Adina Lebo (Toronto Downtown). They shared their experiences and ideas about attracting community leaders to join their Boards; securing local sponsors and affinity partners to support Chapter activities; representing CARP's Advocacy issues at the local and provincial level; community outreach to promote a positive Chapter profile; and forming partnerships with educational institutions to create lifelong learning

opportunities for members. Their enthusiasm, passion and energy communicated a "can do" attitude that inspired everyone in the room.

Minister of State for Seniors, Hon. Alice Wong was Special Guest

Susan Eng arranged for the Hon. Alice Wong, Federal Minister Responsible for Seniors, to be a special guest at the AGM. Minister Wong's address to the group was followed by a Q&A session on issues relating to her portfolio. The Minister expressed her admiration for CARP and noted the government's support and action on issues that CARP has been advocating, including stiffer sentencing for people convicted of Elder Abuse; support for caregivers; and increases in the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS).

Following the Minister's presentation, Eric Vengroff, VP Benefits, outlined some of the new member benefits, including the CARP Health Wizard, an online health care navigation tool that is free to CARP members. Suzanne Boyd, Editor-In-Chief of Zoomer magazine, followed Eric's session with an informative presentation about the magazine's continued growth, some of its awards and the evolution of the CARP Action section.

During the afternoon sessions, Randy Filinski of the Ajax-Pickering Chapter conducted and excellent workshop on Marketing and Promotion for Chapters that was followed by an insightful presentation by Advisory Board member Bill VanGorder on how to recruit and retain top-notch Chapter Board members. Both presentations stimulated a number of helpful ideas and strategies for the Chapters and the staff of the National office.

The honour of the final word for the day was left to Moses, who talked about ZoomerMedia's unique contribution through its broadcast, internet and print assets to support and promote CARP and about our goal of growing the membership as the means of extending the reach and influence of CARP's Advocacy, Mission and New Vision of Aging.

Vancouver, BC

Jeffrey and our BC Representative April Lewis were invited to attend the Round Table on Pensions organized by Vancouver East MP Libby Davies. April Lewis as one of the panelists did an excellent job of outlining CARP's mission, noting how our voices are heard with the help of our many volunteer chapters throughout Canada and the results CARP is getting for Seniors in Canada by having a united voice.

Jeffrey Sefton was there to represent CARP Vancouver Central Chapter to meet attendees and speak with them further about how CARP, as an organization, benefits them and how as members they can be part of the solution.

Victoria. BC

This past year has been busy for the Victoria Chapter, Chaired by Raymond Welch. They have had two categories of events - the educational/informative and the social/fun; both types help increase membership and keep members' interested and active. Meeting topics presented by various experts have included: Power of Attorney and Medical Directives; Finding Work After 50: The Drivable Test - how to pass it and how to appeal it: Your Mind, Brain Plasticity and Brain Research; Pension

Changes; Options For Senior Activism; Scarborough, ON and Alzheimer's - Detection, Prevention and Mitigation.

Social/fun activities included: Movie nights; Movie night/Sushi night (screening the award winning documentary - Jiro Dreams of Sushi; and Dining With The Divas - a bistro evening with great food and up-andcoming Victoria talent.

Fort McMurray, AB

The Fort McMurray Chapter, Chaired by Felix Berube, has had an influence with municipal and provincial governments in mobilizing seniors regarding "aging in place" initiatives. The planned downtown Willow Square Seniors Facility was saved by the combined efforts of local health and seniors groups and CARP galvanizing the local population to stand up to the government and have their concerns addressed. Now Fort McMurray will have two facilities instead of one.

The Chapter also arranged for CARP Advisory Board Chair, Gail Hinchliffe to speak to the Golden Years Society regarding the concerns that arise from projects like Willow Square.

The Chapter has demonstrated a winwin strategy by coordinating the efforts of the various groups in Fort McMurray to have a combined voice in the future life style of those aging in the community.

The Scarborough Chapter under the leadership of Gary Butler have had an excellent developmental year peaking with an outstanding public launch of the Chapter, with over 250 people in attendance at the Scarborough Civic Centre. Dale Goldhawk, host of AM740 Radio's Goldhawk Fights Back was one of the guest speakers. Ross Mayot brought greetings on behalf of Moses Znaimer and the National office of CARP. The Malvern Collegiate Senior Jazz Band performed during the intermission.

Here is an excerpt from the follow up note from Scarborough Chair Gary Butler about the event that illustrates the response from the community:

"I spoke to many of the evening's sponsors who commented that the turnout was exceptional. All the sponsors mentioned their interest in participating in future events and providing sponsorship. MPP Joe Dickson, MPP for Ajax-Pickering, and Parliamentary Assistant to Ontario Minister Responsible for Seniors, had delivered to my house, a beautifully framed congratulatory certificate.

Mary Devine and Michelle DeCoste, of Centennial College said they were overwhelmed by the event, the organization of it as well as the attendance. They have offered their facilities which we will take them up on. The Toronto Police Services, Division 42, informed me of the great reception they received and that they had posted the event on their Facebook page. They would like to make a presentation at future meetings. Nordixx Pole Walking Canada volunteered to do a special clinic for our members."

The Chapter is now set for a very productive year to keep the momentum going that the Chapter has started this year.

Every advocacy organization knows that there is power in numbers and Susan Eng, CARP's Vice President, Advocacy, has often said one of the things that makes her job and CARP's advocacy stand out from the crowd and get the attention of politicians at all levels, is the fact that we have a few

hundred thousand really engaged members throughout the country who can be mobilized to action through our network of Chapters.

CARP Chapters have continued to support the National Office's Advocacy in 2011-2012 and secured some real results. Involvement in issues such as family care giving, healthy aging, age-friendly communities, caregiver support, affordable seniors housing, pension reform, prescription drug use, safe seniors driving, elder abuse, fraud and scam prevention and age-related dementias have local, regional and national significance.

Chapters have been instrumental in harnessing the energy and power of our collective voice to raise awareness and secure results. Chapters have worked with the national office to submit briefs to their provincial governments and the local media on Pension Reform, Affordable Housing for seniors and PharmaCare policies.

All Candidates Meetings

The Edmonton Chapter organized an all-candidates debate in advance of the provincial election in Alberta. They had a great turn out for the event with all five provincial parties providing candidates for the evening. Each

candidate outlined their party's platform and fielded questions healthcare delivery, homecare, and long term care from the audience. These forums demonstrated that CARP definitely has a role to play in promoting democratic participation as part of its goal of better quality of life for Canadians as we age.

CARP Edmonton and CARP Calgary Chapters (represented by Bernice Rempel and Louise Yarrow) have been members of the PIA Seniors Task Force since it was formed about 7 years ago. Its purpose is to bring together seniors groups with partner organizations whose members provide care to seniors and are concerned about the state of seniors care in Alberta. The principal concerns of the Task Force brought up with the Ministers in a meeting held on October 3, 2012, were:

- 1. The Shortage of long term care spaces in Alberta.
- 2. The Need for More Accessible and Affordable Home Care.
- 3. Adequate staffing levels for public home care.
- 4. A Need for Independent Seniors Advocate.

The meeting closed with the ministers recognizing the group as representing the interests of seniors from diverse areas of the province. Minister Horne appeared sincere in his statement welcoming further suggestions on ongoing improvement of healthcare.

The group plans to follow up by sending a summary letter of the meeting discussion to the Ministers. Further efforts will be made to continue the dialogue.

CARP Chapters in Atlantic Canada, BC and Ontario are following the lead of the Alberta Chapters and meeting to work out local strategies to supplement CARP's National Advocacy work with provincial Chapter representation.

Working with CARP VP Advocacy, Susan Eng and her team, Chapters across the country can labour together to increase the volume and effectiveness of our work with Provincial MPPs, MLAs and MNAs.

Spotlight: Halton, ON Chapter

The Halton Chapter had a very busy year in 2011 – 2012. Seven Chapter meetings were held with a wide range of speakers of interest to members. Halton's monthly meeting attendance has risen from an average of about 35 in 2010 to and average of about 135 this past year. Lifelong Learning, a CARP Priority


In keeping with our objective to promote healthy, active aging, the national office and a number of Chapters have been developing relationships with the Continuing Education departments at a number of post secondary institutions about an initiative that will facilitate Lifelong Learning and Continuing Education opportunities for our Chapter members. Along with our Chapters we will continue to build these mutually beneficial relationships that not only provide lifelong learning opportunities for our members, but also support the concept of a community of learning.

The Scarborough Chapter has sustained an excellent relationship with Centennial College where the Chapter holds its meetings. The Downtown Toronto Chapter has continued a strong relationship with St. Michael's College, U of T.

Thanks to the developmental work of April Lewis, CARP's BC Representative, the Third Age Learning at Kwantlen (TALK) program offered through Kwantlen College, has an agreement with the White Rock-Surrey and South Fraser Chapters that allows CARP members to attend TALK courses for free.

On the advocacy front, the Chapter
focused on increasing the GIS,
Pension Reform, introducing a
Universal Pension Plan, increased
Caregiver support, firm action on Elder
Abuse, and the elimination of
mandatory retirement. The Chapter
also tackled seniors-only housing,
pharmacists refusing to accept
Pharmacare cards, driving assessment
fees, wait times, the Emergency Room
crisis, and the need for a provincial
Dementia Strategy.

The Chapter has also established an Environment committee focused on home heating costs, power rates, and green space preservation.

As an active Chapter the local and regional radio, TV and print media now regularly call upon incoming Chapter Chair Bill VanGorder for CARP's views on matters of importance to older Canadians.

The Ministers expressed a keen interest in CARP's work and were very appreciative of CARP's advocacy for older Canadians at both the national and provincial levels. Finance Minister Sheridan supported CARP's efforts to promote a national universal pension plan and indicated that he would be promoting the concept at the next meeting of Federal-Provncial Finance Ministers.

In Moncton, NB CARP met with Cecile Cassista, the Executive Director of New Brunswick's Coalition for Seniors and Nursing Homes Residents' Rights. This was a very productive exchange on how CARP and the Coalition can support our mutual goals. As a national organization it is important to understand and support the efforts of a provincial organization like the Coalition and in turn CARP can help bring the Coalition's provincial voice into the national advocacy.

These meetings provided informative exchanges on the range of issues CARP is advancing, including discussion of the implications of the change in the age of eligibility for OAS and GIS on provincial budgets and CARP's advocacy for continuous integrated care and elder abuse.

The political meetings provided valuable contextual information for the central reason for trip: to meet with our local members at Chapter meetings; stimulate awareness of CARP's mission and to support the work of the Chapters. As one would expect

the needs and interests in the three Maritime Provinces are not uniform, even though our members identified more commonalities than differences amongst the issues facing older Canadians in the provinces.

For example, in **PEI**, the implementation of the new HST is a very hot issue. **New Brunswick** chapter members were particularly concerned about the lack of a plan for catastrophic drug coverage. (New

implications for provincial budgets resulting in the federal

government's changes to OAS eligibility and the need for more provincial resources to be allocated to eradicating elder abuse. It is CARP's position that all levels of government have a responsibility to eradicate elder abuse. CARP called for and supports the recent federal measure to increase sentencing for elder abuse convictions as a major first step in concerted legislative and community action to protect vulnerable seniors from elder abuse.




