CARP Energy/Electoral Poll Report March 21, 2013

Key Findings - Energy Issues

Virtually all CARP members own their homes and they pay, on average, about \$270 a month during the winter in energy costs, or about 15% of their monthly income, on average. Two thirds have time-of-use meters and there is no consensus on whether they save energy or not.

Many think they are paying more than a fair market price for energy, but one quarter believes the cost is fair. Three quarters agree they spent more on energy this winter, while there is a split on whether they are spending more or less or the same amount since they retired. Changes in energy use have resulted in either, more conscientious use, or, in some cases, greater usage because retired members are home more.

Many say they are more concerned about the cost of energy now, but fewer are concerned about the environmental implications. One fifth occasionally have to make economic trade-offs between paying energy bills and other bills, and the strong majority agree governments should subsidize energy costs for low income seniors.

Fair Elections Act

While one half of members initially approve of the proposed Fair Elections Act, far more agree voter participation is a problem than say this of voter fraud. They agree the Act will limit voter participation more than it will prevent fraud. There is wide agreement public hearings should be held on the Act.

While all members have official photo ID, one third voted using the VIC last time, which the Act will forbid, and a twentieth have had to be vouched in the past (also prohibited by the Act), a number which may account for as many as 10,000 or more members.

Electoral Preference

The Liberals maintain their lead over the Conservatives in our latest wave of polling, while the NDP remain a distant third.

Detailed Findings - Energy

The vast majority of CARP members own their homes (91%), and are therefore in a position to manage their energy usage.

On average, about 15% of members' monthly income goes to energy costs, although about one-in-seven pay more than this (15%).

Six-in-ten members have smart meters (61%), and they are evenly split on whether these devices affect their energy usage (30%) or not (32%).

Four-in-ten members say they are paying more for energy than a fair market price (41%), and most say energy prices are artificially high (29%). One quarter say they are paying fair market price (25%), while very few say they are paying less (5%).

Three quarters of members say they are spending more on energy and heating this winter than in the past (77%), although most say this is "somewhat" more (52%).

Members are evenly split on whether they use more (29%) or less (27%) energy now they are retired, while about a third say their usage hasn't changed (32%).

One third of members are turning lights off and time shifting appliance use now (33%) and a further quarter are actually using more now because they're home more, and these are the two biggest changes to energy usage.

Four-in-ten members are more concerned about the cost of energy today (42%), while about one quarter are no more concerned now (23%). Somewhat fewer have concerns about their home's energy use (16%).

One quarter have switched to high efficiency furnaces (27%), while one fifth have sealed windows and doors (18%) in an effort to update their homes. About a tenth have moved (12%) or re-insulated (10%).

Detailed Findings - Fair Elections Act

One half of members approve of the proposed Fair Elections Act (53%), one fifth "strongly" (20%) and one third less emphatically (33%). Just more than a third disapprove of the Act (37%).

The government has introduced a bill revising the Elections Act in several ways, including putting an end to the practice of one person vouching for the identity of another, and restricting the kind of official photo ID that will be required to vote. Do you approve or disapprove of this bill?

While 4-in-10 (42%) agree voter fraud is a problem in Canada (it is not by any measurable standard), almost all agree voter participation is a problem (94%) and fully one half agree strongly (53%).

Two thirds of members agree the Fair Elections Act will reduce voter participation (34%), the problem all see as pervasive, while just one quarter agree the Act will reduce voter fraud (24%), a problem not seen as important.

The government says this bill will reduce voter fraud by, among other things, ending the practice of using the Voter Identification Card as acceptable ID. Critics say this bill will lead to lower voter participation. What do you think will be the outcome?

Electoral Preference

Since the surge in Liberal popularity noted five months ago, when they peaked at 49%, the Conservatives and the Liberals have converged again, and then diverged, with the Liberals in the lead at 45% and the Conservatives in second at 35%. The NDP are the third party at 14%.
